Plans Finalized for September 26 Cedarville Jane Addams Festival

The Cedarville Area Historical Society will host the first annual Jane Addams Festival on Sunday, September 26.

The day's several events are meant to celebrate the September birthday of Cedarville's Jane Addams, winner of the Nobel Peace Prize and founder of Chicago's Hull House.

The day will begin with a 5K run and walk along the Jane Addams Trail between Buena Vista and Cedarville Rd. Registration is available now or at the site at 8:30 a.m. (Call Society President Jim Bade at 815-563-4485 for information.) Registration is \$15 by September 17 or \$18 after that. Participants will take off at 9:30 a.m. Transportation will be furnished after the race to the 1889 school, where awards will be made and a picnic lunch will be available for \$4.

Run and walk participants receive a special T-shirt with their registration.

At the school, visitors will hear late nineteenth century music and will be able to see the new handicapped accessible bathrooms that are expected to be completed by that time.

Also, on display will be samples of the twelve pieces of art work related to the history of Cedarville that will be sold by the historical society. (See pages 4 and 5 of this newsletter for more details.)

Shortly after the end of the lunch, the historical society will commemorate the September 6, 1860, birthday of Jane Addams with a brief ceremony at the Cedarville Cemetery. The public is invited to attend to honor the village's famous citizen.

1889 School Bathrooms Close to Completion; New Projects Started

Construction of handicapped accessible bathrooms in Cedarville's 1889 school, the future museum of the Cedarville Area Historical Society, is virtually complete with only the fixtures and lighting remaining to be installed. Even before that work is finished, several new projects have been started.

Aluminum storm windows for the 17 first floor windows have been ordered and are expected to be delivered within the next two weeks. Board member Dave Kaiser will head volunteers who will scrape and paint the several window frames that show weather damage.

The windows, which were expected to cost \$1,800, came in at \$1,714, thanks to the help of the supplier, Menard's in Freeport.

Cedarville Boy Scouts on September 11 will begin the first phase of land-scaping the area around the school. They will be directed by Pam Rosmann, rural Cedarville, a professional landscape architect who has volunteered her services.

The first phase work will represent the Eagle Scout community service project

of Scout Larry Pittsley, said Don Blomberg, Troop. 862 scoutmaster.

The approximately \$26,500 cost of the bathrooms was raised through contributions. At the present time, the historical society has received more than \$3,100 toward its new goal of \$11,000 needed to install the storm windows, install first floor heating and cooling, connect to the village water supply and do some electrical work.

Corall Strohm was a daughter of Ida Diemer and John D. Strohm. Ida was my grandfather Clarence's sister.

34. (Reference to picture 34 in the exhibit) Leila Strohm was Corall Strohm's sister. She married George DeZell.

Fearon Egdorf was the son of Estelle Diemer and Louis Egdorf.

Delbert Hille was the son of Celia Fox. When she died, he and his sister Thelma were adopted. Delbert lived in San Diego with Weber Fox. Thelma was reared by Ellen Nora Fox Shields Homan and lived in Portland, Oregon.

My mother, Ivy Florence Diemer, came to Portland in 1919 with members of the Diemer and Fox clans.

Mother told me the family history was in a book, "The History of Stephenson County." The Diemers came from Al-

sace-Lorraine in France. I have not seen this book. I was able to view a loaned copy of the reprint at a library in another town but not allowed to check it out of the building. Thus there was insufficient time for study. The reprint omitted the French history.

Mother (*Ivy Diemer*) was born in Cedarville (Buckeye Township) on July 2, 1894.

Her father was Clarence Allan Diemer, born in Buckeye Township January 2, 1869. He was son of Isaac Diemer and Sarah Ellen Jackson. Sarah's parents owned a wool factory.

Her mother (*Ivy's*) was Mary Elizabeth Fox.

Clarence and his brother Joseph were members of a band. Clarence played cornet and Joseph played trombone. Clarence had two sisters, Ida Diemer and Estelle Diemer. (*Turn to page 8*)

Marcet Haldeman Story Evokes Memories in Society Member

(In the August issue of "Echoes", there was a story about the Cedarville Area Historical Society receiving an autographed copy of a book of fairy tales written in 1916 by Marcet Haldeman, niece of Jane Addams. This story brought two letters and several photographs from an Oregon historical society member. The letters and photos contain much historical information and are reproduced here. Editor)

August 13, 2004

Dear Editor:

My mother (Ivy Diemer, b. Cedarville, 1894) named me after Marcet Haldeman. However, due to her French background, she spelled it Marcette. She wanted to call me Marcette Shirley but was overruled by my father who insisted it be Shirley Marcette.

Mother probably attended Cedarville School circa 1900 to 1908. She also completed two years of high school.

33 (Picture 33 in the exhibit) Mabel Goethe was a lifelong friend of my mother. I visited Mabel in 1954 whern I traveled to the Cedarville-Freeport area. We corresponded for years. I sent her Buffalo nickels. She gave me a start of a houseplant she had for many years, which I also maintained for many years.

Mother also mentioned Maude Harnish. She knew all the Finks. Maude Harnish married Robert Fox, my grand-mother's brother.





Last month's restoration and cleaning of the Addams family monument complex in the Cedarville Cemetery inspired Mary Mau, McConnell, and Bonnie Bade, Cedarville, to restore the cemetery headstones of Mary Bright Clingman and her husband George W. Clingman. The couple, who died in the middle 1800s, were the parents of Cedarville pioneer settlers Josiah and Mariah Clingman. G.W. Clingman and his wife are the great great grandparents of Mrs. Mau and the great great grandparents of Mrs. Bade. The markers will be cleaned later.

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Historical Society Unveils 12 Month Cedarville History and Art Program

A program to make Cedarville historical art available to the public has been launched by the Cedarville Area Historical Society.

Twelve eight inch by ten inch color photographs depicting scenes or buildings with historical significance to the village can be purchased on a one-amonth basis from the society. Each of the scenes was painted or sketched by a Stephenson County artist.

The monthly cost is \$12.50 including shipping and mailing Or all twelve pictures can be purchased at one time for \$110 plus \$5 shipping and mailing. All profits from the program will be used to support the historical society.

In addition to the large photos, the artwork is available as note cards with envelopes. A package of six cards costs \$7.50 plus \$1.50 mailing. The purchaser has a choice of a package with scenes 1 through 6, a package with scenes 7 through 12 or a package with six cards of one scene.

The artists participating in the program are Duane Smith, Freeport and formerly of Cedarville; Roger Goodspeed, Cedarville; Ron Beam, Cedarvill

ville; Harlan Corrie, Cedarville; and Pam Barton, Lena.

Smith's three entries include two scenes of Cedar Creek and a sketch of the John Addams-Jane Addams homestead at the end of Mill Street.

Goodspeed's two scenes feature the John Addams barn and the corner of Mill and Second streets around 1910.

Beam has contributed a two-color winter sketch of the John Addams mill and a similar one of the Henney Buggy Company on Mill and Cherry streets.

Corrie's work represents the Cedarville Cemetery in the winter and Cedar Creek looking south from the bridge at the end of Mill Street.

Ms. Barton has recreated two historical events. One depicts the Civil War nighttime ride of a man who shot a hole in a U.S. flag strung across Mill Street. The other shows children peeking at dancers through the second floor windows of Strohms Store on Mill St.

There is also a cartoon by an unknown 1908 artist depicting the well-known Cedarville band led by Clinton Fink.
