Volunteers Demolish 1889 School Ancient Heating System

For the better part of three days, Dave Kaiser, Harlan Corrie and Jim Bade tore out much of the old steam heating system in the 1889 school to make room for the new gas-fired, forced air heating and cooling plant that will service the first floor of the building.

Cedarville Area Historical Society Purchases Three Research Aids

The Cedarville Area Historical Society has purchased two CDs and a book that will help in learning more about Cedarville area history.

Prepared by the Illinois State Archives — an agency under the office of the Secretary of State — the three research aids contain information that has been unavailable to the historical society up to this time. The package cost \$46.

Of immediate value is a CD labeled "The Illinois Federal Township Plats 1804 – 1891." The disc contains all the plats for Stephenson County during that time period. The hand-drawn plats show the landscape as it was before settlers arrived and legal surveying measurements were employed.

The plats indicate various types of natural features and vegetation, including areas of prairie, barrens, timber, cliffs, mounds, ravines, bluffs, salt licks, salt springs and mineral deposits as well as watercourses, swamps and other bodies of water. For navigable watercourses, the plats show surveys of bank meanders, islands, bars, rapids, cascades and waterfalls. Previously established names of natural features are provided. Man-made

made features occasionally are included, such as wagon trails, roads, settlements, towns, fortifications, buildings, farm fields and Indian traces and sites.

A separate CD containing this information is available for each of the 102 counties in the state.

The second CD is a descriptive inventory of "the archives of the state of Illinois." Compiled in 1997, it has 940 pages of information.

The book is labeled "A Summary Guide to Local Governmental Records in the Illinois Regional Archives" and it contains 265 pages. It was originally printed in 1999.

"There is no question these resources will be of great help to all members of the historical society who are interested in researching particular items of Cedarville area history," said Jim Bade, president of the historical society.

"Now we will know where to turn for certain information rather than stumbling around," he added.

Strohm's Store, Scioto Mills Stories Needed

There are some big gaps in the history of Cedarville and the village's immediate area and the Cedarville Area Historical Society wants to start filling them.
