## Members Memories Carolyn Engle Larnia

When I read in our last newsletter where Mr. Bertram invited members to share stories of being connected to Cedarville, I couldn't resist. I loved growing up in Cedarville and have lots of fond memories of my childhood there.

I'm Carolyn Engle Larnia and I moved to Cedarville in 1950 when I was 7 years old to the property that was a nursery owned by a Mr Strohacker (not sure of the spelling). It was across the cow/corn field from the Cedarville school. My family at that time consisted of Mom (Narcissa) and Dad (Dick Engle), sisters Theresa and Patsy. Youngest sister Miriam, came along some years later.

I started school as a second grader. My teacher was Mrs. Goecke. There were three grades in her room at that time-1st, 2nd and 3rd. She was a wonderful teacher. Attended school there through the 6th grade when it was decided to bus the 7th and 8th grade kids to Freeport. I fondly remember Chris Bertram, Galen's grandfather, as the janitor at the school. He would let us ring the school bell sometimes. I had a favorite desk in the 2nd grade and he made sure it went with me into the 3rd and 4th grades. Such a fine gentleman he was.

Some of my favorite memories are recess time, playing tag, kick the can, red light-green light, hide and seek, and others with Cedarville kids. There were times of bike riding, jumping rope, playing jacks, roller skating. My sisters and I would hike down to the Cedar Creek on occasion and look for frogs etc. We had many good friends in Cedarville and I remember so many of them fondly. Chuck Hutchison and his family lived down the hill from our house. He was, as a baby, the survivor of a tornado that claimed the life of his mother. His dad remarried and they had two girls. I had two best friends: Nancy Fransen and Larna Zipse. Nancy and I are Facebook friends along with Gary Wagner who was a year older than I, and with Chuck.

Some other fond memories are of the outdoor movies, events at the Community Hall at Christmas and Halloween, Old Settlers' Day festivities., Memorial Day parades and other occasions that I can't remember offhand. I was in Girl Scouts with Mrs. Ewing as our leader and in 4-H with Mrs Annamarie Zipse as our leader.

Bear's grocery store was a favorite place to go for a treat of some kind. If I remember right, the owners were Flossie and Glen Bear. In the summer time my siters and I would crawl under the barbed-wire fence and cross the field to the school to play on the playground equipment-merry-go-round, slide, swings, trapeze, teeter-totters. Fun times!

There are many more memories too numerous to go into. Just know that I'm very proud of our small community and the wonderful museum we have where its history is being displayed, especial about our "claim to fame" lady, Jane Addams. There will always be a special place in my heart for Cedarville and its memories. Made me very happy that my Mother was part of the museum and enjoyed her years being involved as a member and board member














Above: 1952 Paul Kryder, in uniform, 2nd from the tree

This book, written by Paul Fry. Paul was an industrious researcher when writing this book. He tells the story he unearthed of his aunt's life with great care. Drawing on family memories, Mary's reminiscences and Fry and Addams family letters, including Jane Addam's correspondence, to piece together the year-by-year chronology of Trips, visits, crises, disputes and affections, and delightful days. Mary went to live with Jane's stepmother, Anna Haldeman Addams in 1889 when she was twelve and lived with her in a sort of granddaughter/companion/servant role. 
